Monkey Zone

The Monkey Zone, together with the Zoological Hall, is known as one of the leading monkey collections in Japan. Here visitors can observe and compare the features of various species of monkey.

Zoological Hall

Tropical Rain Forest is the main theme here. You can observe tiny monkeys from South America called marmosets, and other nocturnal creatures. In the Bird Hall, enjoy seeing various tropical birds flying around, and try to find the sloths hiding somewhere. Lost children, Lost and Found, and other general information is available at the Information Desk on the 1st floor.

Children's Zoo

Children can enjoy petting animals such as goats, sheep and mice. They can also see capybaras, the biggest rodents in the world.

Small Animals Zone

See cute, small animals such as the extremely popular red panda. You can also observe swimming beavers and river otters through the glass windows.

Avian and Aquatic Zone

The birds of prey flying in the large aviary, and sea lions and penguins swimming in the water, can be observed through the glass.

Savanna Zone

You can see large carnivorous animals such as cheetahs, hyenas, and lions, as well as large herbivorous animals such as elephants, giraffes, and zebras.
